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# Non-Fiction Books: Blue Like Jazz by Donald Miller




Subtitled "non-religious thoughts on Christian spirituality," Blue Like Jazz is a memoir style collection of essays tracking the ongoing spiritual journey of Donald Miller, an earnest, disenfranchised evangelical who looks for meaning and purpose and beauty in Portland, Oregon.

Donald Miller was the speaker at the 2007 College Conference at Montreat, and "Blue Like Jazz" was recently made into a movie.

# Love Wins by Rob Bell

A firestorm of controversy erupted with the release of this book in 2012. In Love Wins, well known Christian teacher and author Rob Bell, then pastor at Mars Hill Bible Church in Grand Rapids, Michigan, took a unabashed look at the traditional assumptions we make about Christianity's answers to perhaps the hardest and most serious question of life: what is heaven, what is hell, and who goes where? Some say 'Love Wins' raises more questions than answers, but ought to get anyone thinking deeper about the ultimate fate of everyone who ever lived.




# A Farewell to Mars by Brian Zahnd

In this easy to read, well written book, Hamilton introduces us to some of the basic principles at work when we read and interpret the Bible. Hamilton isn't afraid to address the most controversial issues in scripture either, whether it's evolution, homosexuality, slavery, divorce and marriage and the role of women.


#### Mere Christianity by C.S. Lewis





Lewis outlines his basic argument for making sense of the Christian faith—not any one particular tradition of the Christian faith, but the 'mere' Christianity that various Christian traditions together hold in common.

#### **Traveling Mercies by Anne Lamott**

With a refreshing honesty and hilarious irreverence, writer and novelist Ann Lamott traces her own spiritual journey in this memoir style collection of essays on the Christian faith. Ann Lamott is in many ways an unlikely convert—- as she writes, "My coming to faith did not start with a great leap, but rather a series of staggers."




## Take this Bread by Sara Miles





# The Meaning of Jesus by N.T. Wright and Marcus Borg



In this thought provoking book, two Christian New Testament scholars—- the liberal and progressive-minded Marcus Borg and the traditional, orthodox-oriented N.T. Wright together explore the historical figure of Jesus: what modern scholarship can tell us about who Jesus was, how he lived, what he taught, what he cared about, and what he means for the world, theologically. Wright and Borg respectfully respond to one another through a series of essays, each facing a different aspect of Jesus' life, ministry and mission. This book is a must read for anyone interested in the historical study of Jesus.


## Cold Tangerines by Shauna Neiquist






## The Ragamuffin Gospel by Brennan Manning

Growing up as a creationist, denying the theory of evolution, Rachel Held Evans recalls how she came to see the relationship between science and faith in a whole new way; finding it possible to both accept the scientific consensus on the origin of life and be a follower of Christ.




# Fiction Books:

# Wise Blood by Flannery O'Connor

Flannery O'Connor is one of the most celebrated Southern writers of the 20th Century. Her unique style of Southern Gothic literature often explores grotesques characters. Always lying beneath the surface is her Catholic perspective, which often surfaces with themes of sin and redemption.

Wise Blood is perhaps O'Connor's most famous novel: "focused on the story of Hazel Motes, a twenty-two-year-old caught in an unending struggle against his innate, desperate fate, this tale of redemption, retribution, false prophets, blindness, blindings, and wisdoms gives us one of the most riveting characters in twentieth-century American fiction."



## Everything that Rises Must Converge by Flannery O'Connor




A Collection of short Stories: "Flannery O'Connor was working on Everything That Rises Must Converge at the time of her death. ### The Screwtape Letters by C.S. Lewis

In this epistolary novel, C.S. Lewis explores the way evil works with delightful satire. Written from the perspective of Screwtape, a "senior devil," these letters are addressed to Wormwood, "a junior devil," who is learning how to tempt a human being. Through the words of Screwtape, Lewis shows us the way evil and sin manipulate us and fool us into thinking the world is all about us, and not about God.



### The Great Divorce by C.S. Lewis




Set in a sprawling city of ever abandoned homes named hell, and at the gates of heaven, "The Great Divorce" creatively explores the question of salvation in the Christian faith through uncommon imagery of what heaven and hell might look like.

### Silence by Shasaku Endo

Written by the late Catholic Japanese author Shasaku Endo, "Silence" is a historical novel that follows two Jesuit missionaries to Japan through great suffering and persecution. Throughout the book, God's ongoing silence during the missionary's suffering is deafening, raising one of the greatest questions of the Christian faith: where is God when we suffer? Silence explores and responds to this question with beautiful poignancy.




#### Gilead by Marilynne Robinson
